lunch at Wrap It Up, 830 S. 8th St. Look at the second page of the menu at www.wrapitupmanitowoc.com/menu.html and decide from among the cold wraps. Tell Mary what kind of tortilla (Southwest, jalapeño, white, whole wheat, tomato basil or spinach) you would like for your wrap.

For the rest of the day along Lake Michigan, you have three options:

- A 45-minute tour at 1:30 p.m of the USS Cobia (WWII submarine) at the Wisconsin Maritime Museum, 75 Maritime Dr. (\$12)
- A one-hour tour at 1:30 of the Manitowoc North Breakwater Lighthouse, 425 Maritime Dr. (\$10)
- The Wisconsin Sand-Sculpting Festival at Red Arrow beach, 1831 S. 9th St. (\$5) Afternoon activities start at 1 p.m. See sand sculptures that will be judged, sculpting demos, and the quick sand sculpting championship at 4 p.m. (The festival ends at 5 p.m.)

Besides telling Mary your wrap preference, let her know if you need a ride or would like to provide a ride, which afternoon option you choose to do, and
