### PRESIDENTS' MESSAGE

"Incredible" is a word that has been so trivialized as to become meaningless, but it is appropriate for the on-going Open World program welcoming physicians from war-torn Ukraine. The experience of these courageous people was made more poignant by hearing the account of one participant who has lived for more than 200 days in the basement of her hospital after shelling obliterated her beautiful home in Kharkiv.



The contributions of our club members, the American Red Cross in Madison, Versiti Blood Center of Wisconsin, and Medical College of Wisconsin have been truly incredible. Club members responded to Nancy Rubly's call for hosts with enthusiasm. Jan and Bob Blazich (whose Thiensville Ro-

tary Club has raised over \$3,000 for war relief), Kathy Luglio, Chris and Dave Vogel, Gayle Best and David Martinez, and Carrie and Jim Landers are all acting as hosts as we write this. Dave Kalan, Nancy Rubly and Dorothy and Ed Kelley are acting as dinner hosts. Jack Bridich drove a van, the use of which was donated by Ewald Chevrolet. Others volunteered, too.

Early planners like Chris Vogel, Cris Reischl and Iva Richards passed the baton to Kevin Hesse of Red Cross of Madison, Tifany Frazer of MCW, and Sue Johnson and Mary Parlow of Versiti. At the Red Cross headquarters in Madison, senior executives, department heads and staff, in heartwarming fashion, demonstrated their solidarity with the mission of improving Ukraine's blood supply system. At last count, at least <u>24 staffers</u> of MCW and Versiti have given their time to produce an outstanding program.

As important as the site visits and demonstrations is the offer by participating institutions to establish long-term relationships — that is, networking — after the program is over. We believe that we have fulfilled one of the purposes of Friendship Force: to serve the cause of peace.
