**NOVEMBER 14: fort atkinson**

Join your FFGM friends on Thursday, Nov. 14, for a fun-filled day in Fort Atkinson. No, we are not going to the Fireside Theatre! Instead, we'll see a fort and Indian mounds, learn about our dairy heritage, tour a farm market, and have lunch at an Irish pub.

We start at the Hoard Dairy Museum and National Dairy Shrine at 401 Whitewater Ave. You need to be there at 11 a.m. for a welcome and introduction followed by a self-guided tour and a 17-minute video. You will learn about local history, the Blackhawk War, mysteries of the mounds, dairy farming, and cow breeds. As a bonus, we will be there the week of the Blackhawk Annual Art Show. The Hoard Museum is free but requests a \$5 donation, which you can pay individually on site.

After the Hoard, we head to a 12:45 p.m. lunch at Paddy Coughlin's Pub at 14 Sherman Ave. You will order off the menu, and you can request individual checks.

Next we'll visit the Jones Dairy Farm Market at 601 Jones Ave. After a free, half-hour guided tour at 2:15 p.m., you might like to shop for some of the market's meat products or try some of its ice cream.

This ends the organized group activities, and you are on your own to explore the area further . . . or head home. Please consider sticking around. Three top places to see are:

1. The Panther Intaglio, a quick stop at 1230 Hwy. 106, which is also Riverside Drive. This is the **ONLY** known intaglio effigy mound in the world. Normally the mounds are elevated, but this is a reverse mound, a depression, in the shape of a panther. It dates back to about 1000 A.D. There is only a historical marker and the intaglio effigy to see.
2. Indian Mounds Park at W7561 Koshkonong Road. There are 11 effigy mounds, new signage, and a walking trail.
3. Fort Koshkonong This is a replica of the original fort from the Blackhawk War. It is located in Rock River Park on Riverside Drive.

More bonus items to check out: Poyer's Farm Market at 323 N. 4th Street, 9 to 6 p.m. which is known for homemade pies, and Simple Life Country Store at N2795 Ebbert Lane, 10 to 4 p.m. This Amish store sells bulk food.

Please contact Ann Line a to let her know you are coming by Nov. 10, as a lunch count needs to be called in. No money is needed in advance. Also, if you are interested in car pooling, please let Ann know.

# LOOSEN, FREIER NOMINATED TO LEAD FFGM BOARD

At the Annual Meeting on Dec. 15, you'll be asked to vote for Dave Loosen to be FFGM's new President and for Stephanie Freier as Vice President. The club continues to seek someone to fill the Treasurer's position.

When Dave retired in 2011 after a 38-year career with the Milwaukee County Council of the Boy Scouts of America, he was able to "close the loop" and put to good use his long-ago zoology degree. He volunteers hundreds of hours each year at the Milwaukee County Zoo, giving tours and Animal in Action talks, and helping with special events and educational programs — "a little bit of everything."

This year, he expects to have spent more than 500 hours at the zoo, where he especially enjoys interactions with guests and "continually learning new things."

The late Gary Drescher recruited Dave and his wife Lynne to join FFGM at least ten years ago. They have occasionally traveled on journeys and have hosted small dinners and 5ths at 5s at their West Allis home, and participated in many club activities. Last summer, Dave led FFGM members on a zoo tour.

Dave also served for 28 years as Scoutmaster for a troop of 50 to 55 boys in West Allis and is proud that during those years, 75 young men achieved the rank of Eagle Scout, including his son.

A Milwaukee native, Dave graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee in zoology. But jobs in that field were scarce, and the Boy Scouts were recruiting. So Dave, himself an Eagle Scout, joined

the county council's staff. His final job before retiring was as Director of Support Services, with responsibility for camp operations and risk management, among other duties.

Dave also helps when needed at Mount Hope Lutheran Church, where Lynne is very active in its Ministries program that includes a food pantry and provides clothing and household goods to needy families. He also continues to be an assistant scoutmaster for his West Allis troop, although it shrank dramatically during the pandemic.

He and Lynne have a daughter, a son, and two grandchildren.

Stephanie, nominee for Vice President, was born and raised in Wisconsin and was inspired to travel by her grandparents, Don and Terry Peters, who were members of FFGM. She has a daughter, 15, and son, 12, with whom she has shared her love of travel and exploring the world.

As an Aerospace Engineer by degree, Stephanie loves data, project management and budgeting. She started her career as a Robotics Flight Controller in Mission Control for the Space Shuttle at NASA's Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. Then she spent time with Rockwell Collins on business jets before joining Kohler, where for nine years she has worked in Kitchen and Bath Operations and most recently in Hospitality responsible for Environmental Health and Safety and Program Management.

Stephanie is a part of FFI's volunteer task force responsible for improving the onboarding and retention of new members.
